Irrigation Panel Safety

There are times when damage is very apparent when you are getting ready to start your irrigation system, but there are other times, when it might not be so noticeable, which makes it much more dangerous, and why you should always do an inspection before reaching for the panel door.



Mice are the biggest culprits for damage and causing hazardous conditions. Even if the mice have not caused a short, removing the debris can be hazardous.

Before you start your system for the first time each spring, take a couple of minutes to look over the equipment. Walk around the panel and motor looking for any arc marks or burn holes. Are any of the doors opened far enough for mice to get in? If there are any arc marks or burns on the equipment, do not touch it. Contact Wheat Belt to remove the main fuses at the transformers, so that you can safely open the doors and work on the equipment.

Contact Wheat Belt during normal working hours to schedule the repair. If you are not sure what to look for, you may want to contact an electrician to start your inspection, and make sure everything is working properly.

Electricity will follow any path to ground, such as water or metal. This can create a shock hazard to anyone nearby or in contact with the equipment. Keep this in mind. If it is shorting, it may be electrifying nearby pipes or equipment.

Please take the time to check your systems before you need them, and always take the time to inspect your system before you start it.

Scammers can copy official logos, and even provide an address that looks as though they are coming from that company. Always take the time to verify before you act.

Our rural areas continue to struggle with maintaining population and sustaining a vibrant economy. One of the key pieces to this sustainability is being able to keep up with the rest of the world. The state of Nebraska created a rural broadband task force to study what obstacles are

limiting rural broadband development, preventing "on par" access with the urban areas.

I have been afforded the opportunity to represent public power in

Nebraska on this task force. Our utilities continue to evolve, and the needs for robust digital communication are ever increasing as we push the grid to optimum efficiencies. Our needs and costs for this communication is as great as the communities. I have always been a believer that we should all work together to accomplish the same or similar tasks. Since our needs will require better highspeed communication and the infrastructure to support it, I believe it is worth exploring to see if we can help solve the rural broadband issue by sharing communication infrastructure in the rural Happy Easter Sunday, April 21

areas with others who provide broadband service. There are four subcommittees of the task force, Nebraska Universal Service Fund, Data, Technologies, and Public-Private Partnerships. I serve on the Public-Private Partnership subcommittee, and have been exploring different models of working together in the

rural areas.

Wheat Belt and Public Power are not advocating that we solve this challenge, nor that we should venture from our core mission of providing safe, affordable,

and reliable electric service. We are advocating for our rural communities, for bringing service in the most cost-effective manner, and for utilizing all of our resources for the common good.

Heat related deaths, especially children, have been recorded even in the winter months. Never leave a child or pet in a car. Heat and cold related deaths are the leading weather-related killers in the United States.
